I though you should know – December 27, 2020

Merry Christmas! I am so grateful to everyone whose help put blessings into our celebration of Christmas: if the first place, to our wonderful ministers of hospitality, our greeters and ushers, and to their fearless leaders Elizabeth and Barry. Then also to our extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist, our lectors and Karen and John and Jeanne and everyone helped us to receive Jesus and his message on Christmas. Thank you, too, to Greg and Annette for helping us pray with music, and for Kevin and Debbie and Deacon Jim for a thousand and one little tasks behind the scenes. God bless you!

Here's the last installment of our "Peace on Earth" homily series from last week" We have also put in this bulletin the prayer passages that were handed out in church on the weekend of December 20th.

Christmas is close. This is the week when we will hear the joyful Gospel of Christmas, the story of Jesus' birth and angels singing to shepherds, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth *peace to those on whom his favor rests." So, let's take a moment, right now, to seek God's peace. Would you mind closing your eyes, sitting back for a moment, and following along with this next part?*

Let us remember that we are in the Holy Presence of God. <Pause> Let's look back on the last day, the last 24 hours, and whatever was good in that day, let's give God thanks for it in our heart. <Pause> Let's look back on the last day, the last 24 hours, and whatever was bad in that day, wherever we sinned or missed the mark, let's ask God to forgive in our hearts. <Pause> Let's look to the days ahead, to the weeks ahead, and whatever we would like God to bless, whomever we would like God to help, let's bring him those people and those situations now in our heart. <Pause> Now, if you can, if you can, tell God in your heart, "I love you." <Pause>

Ok, you can open your eyes now, if you want. Thank you for taking time to pray.

Here at Immaculate Heart of Mary, we have been preparing for Christmas by learning to pray well. The scripture readings we heard this week have a lesson for praying well that is like God's voice: quiet but very powerful. Do you remember how our Gospel reading began? "The angel Gabriel was sent from God". We have a beautiful picture of that scene here in our sanctuary: Mary in prayer, and "the angel Gabriel ... sent from God". Here's what we should notice: God went first. Yes, Mary was in prayer. Yes, Mary's attention to the Lord in prayer was important. Yes, Mary's free response to the Lord was crucial. But the Lord went first, the Lord took the initiative, the Lord sent the angel. First, the Lord acts and speaks good news and assurance of his favor and invites. Then, Mary responds with faith, hope, and love. The Lord went first.

The same message was in our first reading. King David—like Eddie, Clark Griswold's brother-in-law—wanted do for the Lord, "something <wink> really nice". But the Lord stops David. He stops David from building the Lord a house. The Lord says: "Should you build me a house to dwell in? It was I who took you from the pasture and from the care of the flock to be commander of my people Israel. I have been with you wherever you went, and I have destroyed all your enemies before you." The Lord goes on to say to David, "[I will] establish a house for you." David's well-meaning plan to do "something really nice" and for the Lord and build him a house had everything backward. As it had always been in David's life, in this matter of building a house, the Lord would go first.

The same is true of our spiritual life. The Lord goes first, the initiative lies with the Lord, the Lord's actions are more important than our actions, the Lord's plans are more important that our plans, and the Lord's words are more important than our words. Apply that insight to your prayer life, and you can see how important it is that you find some way in prayer to listen to the Lord. The Lord really does love you, and so he is eager, joyful, waiting to hear you speak in prayer. Your words matter to him like a child's conversation matters to a good father. And yet, and yet, and yet, so much of the power and the peace in your prayer comes when you little by little find a way not only to talk, but also to listen to the Lord.

And that's why I want to propose to you, invite you, even challenge you, to bring scripture, reading some of the bible, into your prayer this week. The bible is the Lord's word. Taking time for personal scripture reading is a powerful yet simple way to start listening to the Lord. So, let me give you a four quick tips on praying with scripture, then we'll

practice it, and we'll be done.

First tip: faith. The difference between reading scripture or studying scripture and praying with scripture is faith. It is wonderful to read scripture, and even if you don't have faith, you can gain wisdom from studying scripture. But when we pray with scripture we approach scripture with faith, with the humble trust that the mysterious Creator of heaven and earth who made the furthest galaxy and shaped the interior of the atom, knows me, spoke in history, and so has provided in these words that I am about to read some message or instruction or encouragement for me.

Second tip: slow. It is ok to go slow. You only need to read a little. There is no pressure to finish. It is not a race. If you spend your whole prayer time with one line—you win! If you think about only one word—huzzah! Take your time and enjoy the words. Read some out loud a few times, and share with God what you are noticing and thinking about as you hear them.

Third tip: humble. The bible is a deep well. You and me? We are mostly beginners. So it makes a lot of sense to start with and to return often to the parts of the bible that are easier to read and apply, like the Gospels.

Fourth tip: remember. Really, this is the big one, the one I hope you remember. Remember that the Lord is already paying attention to you. In prayer, you give him the joy of paying attention to him. As you read, try to remember, and to say yes to, the Lord's loving attention to you.

Ok, let's practice. Would you take out the colored card in the back of the pew in front of you? No need to fear COVID: we are completely changing out the cards after each mass. On the front of the card is today's Gospel; on the back, a gospel for Christmas and some more ideas for reading scripture. Not only can you take these cards home to keep or to share with a friend, but it will even help us out, because that is fewer that we have to gather up and recycle. Please find the side that says "The Annunciation". We are going to practice praying with scripture right now. Everyone ready? Ok, let's pray.

"The angel Gabriel was sent from God to a town of Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph, of the house of David, and the virgin's name was Mary. And coming to her, he said, "Hail full of grace! The Lord is with you!" <Pause>

Did any word or phrase stand out for you? If so, stop and think about it, and then talk with God about it. If no, keep reading slowly, quietly, to yourself. Let's listen for the Lord speaking in prayer. <Quiet time>

Luke, chapter 1, verses 26-38 The Annunciation

The angel Gabriel was sent from God to a town of Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph, of the house of David, and the virgin's name was Mary. And coming to her, he said, "Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you."

But she was greatly troubled at what was said and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. Then the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. "Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give him the throne of David his father, and he will rule over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end."

But Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I have no relations with a man?" And the angel said to her in reply, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. Therefore the child to be born will be called holy, the Son of God. And behold, Elizabeth, your relative, has also conceived a son in her old age, and this is the sixth month for her who was called barren; for nothing will be impossible for God."

Mary said, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word."

Then the angel departed from her.

Luke, chapter 2: 1-14 The Birth of Jesus

In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that the whole world should be enrolled. This was the first enrollment, when Quirinius was governor of Syria. So all went to be enrolled, each to his own town. And Joseph too went up from Galilee from the town of Nazareth to Judea, to the city of David that is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and family of David, to be enrolled with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child.

While they were there, the time came for her to have her child, and she gave birth to her firstborn son. She wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn.

Now there were shepherds in that region living in the fields and keeping the night watch over their flock. The angel of the Lord appeared to them and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were struck with great fear.

The angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for behold, I proclaim to you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For today in the city of David a savior has been born for you who is Christ and Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find an infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger."

And suddenly there was a multitude of the heavenly host with the angel, praising God and saying: "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests."

Saint Sylvester I Saint of the Day for December 31

Saint Sylvester I's Story

When you think of this pope, you think of the Edict of Milan, the emergence of the Church from the catacombs, the building of the great basilicas—Saint John Lateran, Saint Peter's, and others—the Council of Nicaea, and other critical events. But for the most part, these events were planned or brought about by Emperor Constantine.

A great store of legends has grown up around the man who was pope at this most important time, but very little can be established historically. We know for sure that his papacy lasted from 314 until his death in 335. Reading between the lines of history, we are assured that only a very strong and wise man could have preserved the essential independence of the Church in the face of the overpowering figure of the Emperor Constantine. In general, the bishops remained loyal to the Holy See, and at times expressed apologies to Sylvester for undertaking important ecclesiastical projects at the urging of Constantine.

Reflection

It takes deep humility and courage in the face of criticism for a leader to stand aside and let events take their course, when asserting one's authority would only lead to useless tension and strife. Sylvester teaches a valuable lesson for Church leaders, politicians, parents, and others in authority.
