I though you should know – January 31, 2021

We are started a new message series last week called “Use words when necessary”. It’s about the power our words have for helping other people—and especially for helping them come to believe in Jesus and be happy with him forever in heaven! The first installment of the message series is below, and we’ll be learning about this topic at our weekend Masses until Lent.

As far as I can tell, the most important thing we can do right now to make our parish fulfill the mission Jesus gave us is to work on becoming a **growing parish of growing disciples**. When I say disciple, I’m trying to talk about something important and deep, but not complicated. Disciples are people who know Jesus Christ, believe in him as their Savior, love Jesus as their God and friend, follow him as Lord of their daily life, and worship him each week. Catholic disciples stick with Jesus’ Church and honor Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. If we were a growing a parish of growing disciples, we would be a community of people trying more and more to become good disciples, and we would be a community were lots of people regularly make that first choice for discipleship and set out on the journey of faith with Jesus our Lord. Next week I’ll tell you more about why I think becoming a growing parish of growing disciples is our most important task.

In the days ahead, I hope to make some decision with our parish staff about our next steps to become a growing parish of growing disciples. If you have ideas about what is most likely to help Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish make more disciples, please share them with us! And we are always looking for ideas on how to improve Sunday Mass, especially for people who are starting or restarting their faith. But I’d also like to ask for your prayers in a special way in the days ahead. Would you please join us in a novena of prayers for our parish? Please join us in praying following prayer for the next nine days.

**Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful,
and enkindle in them the fire of your love.
Send forth your Spirit, and they shall be created,
and you shall renew the face of the earth.**

**Lord Jesus, grant we pray,
to each of us at Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish,
the Spirit’s gifts of wisdom, counsel, and fortitude,
so that we may find our next steps to serve you,
and persevere in them.**

**God our Father, pour out the gifts of your Holy Spirit on the world.
You send the Spirit on your Church to being the teaching of the Gospel:
now let the Spirit continue the work in the world
in the hearts of all who believe.
We ask this through Christ our Lord, Amen.**

Immaculate Heart of Mary, pray for us.

If you are offended by what I’m about to say, please give me a chance to clarify. My least favorite quote from Saint Francis is: “Preach the Gospel always, use words when necessary.” Now before a Franciscan charges the pulpit, let me clarify. Clarification number 1: St. Francis never said it. Memes attribute it to him, but in what Francis wrote and in what the early stories say about him, Francis never said, “Preach the Gospel always, use words when necessary.” Clarification number 2: He did say something similar. When writing instructions for his brother Franciscans, St. Francis explained who should preach, and then wrote, “All the brothers, however, should preach by their actions”. Clarification number 3: the fact that St. Francis St. Francis said something so similar points out that meme quote does have something right: sometimes actions do speak louder than words; it’s important to show, not just to tell.

Clarification number 4: there is something I love about the St. Francis meme quote: it is fun to adapt. Say you are making hot fudge brownie sundaes tonight—if you are, invite me over—raise the ice cream scoop before your family or friends and say, “Preach the Gospel always, use ice cream when necessary!” In pandemic, “preach the gospel always,

use sanitize when necessary!” When playing Minecraft with a friend, “Preach the gospel always, use Unbreaking III Power V Flame Infinity Punch bows” when necessary.” And if someone in your home leaves the toilet plugged, tell them, “Preach the gospel always, use plungers when necessary.” ☺

Clarification five (and final): the fun of adapting the meme quote is sort of my problem with it. We can say about almost anything, “Preach the gospel always, use ___blank___ when necessary.” So it seems to me that the meme quote implies that words are optional, no more important for preaching the Gospel than ice cream, or hand sanitizer, or Minecraft, or plungers. But is that true? Are words optional? Is it really a viable option for most people to help others as Jesus intended, without ever using words? Is it a viable option to ask people what they think about Jesus, to help people learn about Jesus, to invite others to spend time with Jesus, all without ever mentioning his name?

NO!

Words are necessary. Look, this is pretty simple. Jesus did the whole “love God, love others, make disciples” thing pretty much perfectly. He did not do it just by walking around and being kind. He didn’t even do it just by praying and working miracles—and he could work miracles! For Jesus to do the good the Father had planned for him, for Jesus to fulfill his purpose in life, words were necessary. The same is true of us, too, because “no disciple is greater than his master”. For us to fulfill our purpose in life, and for us to do the good the Father planned for us, and for us to help people meet Jesus, live better, and get to heaven, words are necessary.

Think of the power words have. In my mind there are words people have said to me—good words, hard words—that stick with me, so much so that for some of those words, they are almost a part of who I am. Your words have great power. What is more, the Word of God has power. It has so much power, the Word of God is so important that Pope Francis said that from this year forward, this Sunday is going to be dedicated to the Word of God, so that we pay attention to its power.

Now, the amazing good news is that the grace, the beauty, the hope, the joy, the power of the Word of God is supposed to—and really can—come to others through you, through your words. But, for that to happen, words are necessary. Your words are necessary.

So that’s why we’re starting this week a four part homily series called “Use words when necessary”. The plan is simple, because none of us are experts in talking with others about God. First, we are going to notice some times in people’s lives when our words are necessary, when we can really help others by our words. Second, we are going to give you some simple ideas on how to get started talking about Jesus with others. If you love God and wish you could help other people love him this series is for you. I hope you’ll join us for the next three weeks.

Here’s a simple time when words are necessary: when we see someone is ready to get started, ready to take another step towards God. Think about what Jesus did in the Gospel today. He was walking along the seashore in Galilee, and Jesus saw Peter and Andrew there. Now Peter and Andrew had already met Jesus, had spent time with him, and they thought he might be the Messiah. But they had not started following him. They were there by the shore of the Sea of Galilee, doing their job as fishermen, cleaning their nets. What got Peter and Andrews started in following Jesus? It was *Jesus’ words of invitation: “Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men.*

So, when you see someone and you know that or think that or wonder if that person is ready to get started, to try something new, to move a little nearer to God, speak the name of Jesus. For example, if someone asks you to pray for them, ask back if you can pray for them right there, and then say a prayer that speaks the name of Jesus; the Hail Mary is one prayer like that, but you can simply use your own words, too. Or, if you are having a deep conversation with someone, and the time seems right, ask that person what they think about Jesus, and then just listen really carefully and respectfully to what they have to say. Or, if someone needs a little encouragement, tell them the reason for your hope, and connect that hope you have to some story you remember about Jesus.

My sister, my brother, God has a plan for you, and you have a part in God’s plan. So, your words are powerful, and sometimes, necessary. I invite you to look this week for a time when you can say that powerful name, the name “Jesus”.

Oh no! You want me to say something?

I don't know about you, but I do not like confrontation. Moments of uncomfortable conversation, awkward silence or saying what needs to be said can be difficult. I believe it is more than concern for myself, I do not want to make someone uncomfortable, unhappy or conjure any negative emotion that may arouse. Yet, I have discovered, if I truly care about the person; not having the conversation can be more about me coming out of my box. If there is something someone needs to know, words are necessary. God plans to speak through us, as disciples he calls on us to be his word to people we encounter.

Years ago, my daughter Alison, delivered a message from God, words that I needed to hear. It wasn't actually something I wanted to hear. It wasn't a compliment, but it was certainly on target and exactly what I need to know. It left me with my jaw open and speechless. She was about twelve years old, we were in the car, driving up our alley towards Leona (See what an impact it made on me! I remember specific details.) I was evidently fussing about something I had done for someone, actually I must have been complaining. Out of the blue, this twelve-year-old, love of my life, said, "Mom, don't you just do things for people because you want to be nice and help them?" It wasn't critical, it wasn't judgmental, she just stated what she believed to be true. Wow! Those words have been a guide for me, the past seventeen years or so. When I do something, it is out of the desire to help someone. There is No room for fussing. There is gratitude for being able to help.

Have you had a nudge to share your wisdom; your faith, your kindness, support or a thought with someone? Maybe a compliment or smile to a stranger, a friendly hello and offer of support to someone struggling, offering to pray or stopping at that moment and praying with someone in need, shared wisdom... There are endless opportunities to serve Jesus, to be his disciples here and now! Disciples are not just in the Bible. WE are disciples. May we continue grow in our faith as we reach out to serve and help others who are on their way as growing disciples and as we reach out to those who may not know Jesus.

Whether you have been a Catholic your entire life, a convert or someone searching for faith, you may feel like you were inadequately catechized. This may be a reality and it is something we can definitely pursue. **The Good News is, as we strive to be better disciples, we are not alone.** The Holy Spirit is in us. When we were confirmed the bishop asked God to bestow on us; the Spirit of Knowledge, Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel, Fortitude, Piety, and Fear of the Lord (reverence and respect for God.) We have these gifts of the Holy Spirit. May we strive to strengthen our awareness of these gifts and put them to good use as we strive to live our lives as disciples.

First spend time in prayer, ask God to give you the wisdom to know if this is something **You** want to say or something **God** wants you to say, ask him to give you the words, the nudge, the shove if need be. **"Lord, I want to please you. Remove anything that blocks my words and actions. May I be aware of the gifts of the Spirit that lives within me, that I may be the disciple you have called me to be. Amen."**

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SEVEN GIFTS OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

Wisdom is the ability to exercise good judgment. It distinguishes between right and wrong, seeks and upholds truth and justice, and balances personal good with the common good. It is in touch with reality, demonstrates common sense and is prudent. It often increases as a person advances in years and gains life experience. In the Old Testament, wisdom is personified by “Sophia,” the mythical mother of faith, hope and love; while in the New Testament, wisdom is personified by Jesus himself.

Understanding is the gift of intelligence and enlightenment. It is the ability to think clearly; to perceive, comprehend and interpret information; and to have insight and discern meaning.

Counsel is good advice. It is the ability to teach, inform, guide, direct, warn, admonish, recommend, and encourage. It is not limited to the giving of advice but extends to the ability to graciously receive it. The gift is needed by parents, teachers, coaches, supervisors, mentors, therapists, lawyers, clergy, consultants, elders, and spouses — anyone who offers advice to others.

Fortitude is an unwavering commitment to God or a proper course of action, and it shows itself as moral strength, courage, determination, patient endurance, long suffering, a resolute spirit, stamina, and resiliency.

Knowledge is the ability to study and learn; to acquire, retain and master facts and information; and to put what is learned to good use for constructive purposes.

Fear of the Lord is awe, reverence, and respect for God. It acknowledges that everything comes as a gift from God, downplays personal achievement and self-sufficiency, and gladly offers praise, worship and adoration to God.

Piety is personal holiness, and it includes devotion to God, prayer, virtue, goodness, decency, self-mastery, innocence, the avoidance of sin and obedience to God’s will.

Ok, you have been reminded that, through your confirmation you have the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit So now what am I supposed to do?

Begin using your gifts. Find ways to strengthen them and ways to be more aware of their presence. Use your gifts. Not using your gifts would be like buying groceries and leaving them in the car. Not only are you not using them, they will go to waste.

“Lord, help me to honor the gifts you have given me. May I use them in my daily life to be aware of your presence in my life and to help others know you. Amen”

Saint of the Week



Saint Joseph of Leonissa
Saint of the Day for February 4

Saint Joseph of Leonissa's Story

Joseph was born at Leonissa in the Kingdom of Naples. As a boy and as a student in early adulthood, Joseph drew attention for his energy and virtue. Offered a nobleman's daughter in marriage, Joseph refused and joined the Capuchins in his hometown in 1573 instead. Avoiding the safe compromises by which people sometimes undercut the gospel, Joseph denied himself hearty meals and comfortable quarters as he prepared for ordination and a life of preaching.

In 1587, he went to Constantinople to take care of the Christian galley slaves working under Turkish masters. Imprisoned for this work, he was warned not to resume it on his release. He did and was again imprisoned and then condemned to death. Miraculously freed, he returned to Italy where he preached to the poor and reconciled feuding families as well as warring cities which had been at odds for years. He was canonized in 1745.

Reflection

Saints often jar us because they challenge our ideas about what we need for "the good life." "I'll be happy when. . .," we may say, wasting an incredible amount of time on the periphery of life. People like Joseph of Leonissa challenge us to face life courageously and get to the heart of it: life with God. Joseph was a compelling preacher because his life was as convincing as his words.

If you are a senior city resident and need help with your **Property Tax Credit or Circuit Breaker** (as popularly called), here are two options:

Call the St. Louis Area Agency on Aging (SLAAA) at 314-612-5918 which is offering this service by telephone this year.

Lutheran Senior Services (LSS) has a social worker who will complete your Property Tax Credit at your home. She will also complete a benefits checklist for St. Louis City to determine if you are eligible for any other benefits.
