News from our Pastor I thought you should know-July 18, 2021

In the last year, we've been working on a big goal for Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish: "Dramatically Better Sundays by August 15, 2021." August 15th is getting close, and I'd love to know what you think. Have we made the Saturday evening vigil and Sunday morning Mass here at Immaculate Heart of Mary dramatically better than they were a year ago? If so, how? If not, what are the opportunities we are missing or the problems we need to tackle?

I believe that Jesus wants our parish to grow and to grow disciples. How do we do that? I think better weekend worship at Mass should be at the heart of our strategy and our top priority. This week and in next week's pastor's column, I'd like to explain why Sunday Mass (and Saturday vigil, too; that counts for Sunday) is so important.

First, Sunday Mass is important because Jesus is the heart of our faith, the Eucharist is Jesus, and Sunday is the Lord's Day. If we do good as a parish, but don't lead people to Jesus, what good are we really doing? If we lead people to Jesus, but after all our efforts, they don't understand and they don't value something as basic and important as time with Jesus at Sunday Mass, what have we accomplished? It makes sense to have Sunday Mass at the heart of our strategy because until people love Jesus at Mass, our efforts to help them follow Jesus are not yet complete.

Second, Sunday Mass is important because Sunday Mass is our best way to get everyone at our parish involved in our mission to make disciples. How many of us can engage a neighbor in subtle debates about theology? How many of us can solve a family member's heartfelt hurts? I have trouble doing that and I've had years of training as I became a priest! But how many of us can love our neighbors and, when the opportunity is open, invite them to Mass? We all can do that. Don't you think that Jesus wants us to reach all sorts of people, not just the few people I run into as a priest? Don't you think that Jesus wants to meet the people dear to you, the people who know you love them? Inviting people to meet Jesus can't just be the job of a priest or a staff member or a committee. It's everyone's job, because everyone has someone whom God puts in our lives for years or for just a few weeks, someone we are supposed to love, someone for whom your invitation is uniquely empowered by the Holy Spirit. It makes sense to have Sunday Mass at the heart of our strategy because the easiest way to introduce someone to Jesus is to invite them to spend time with us and Jesus at Sunday Mass.

Next week I'll share with you two more reasons why I think Sunday Mass should be our priority. As ever, I'd love to hear what you think. God bless you!

Fr. Nord's Homily-July 11, 2021

I hope you had a great Fourth of July; for me, it was a great one with homemade patriotic pie from dad and mom and some of the best fireworks I've ever seen thanks to an invitation from my sister-in-law. But then something strange happened. You would think that getting so many blessings from God would make me grateful, and gratitude would make me generous. But in fact, I ran my life the last week opposite way. I suppose the great holiday made me hungry for more. And I regret to say that as I felt how precious life was, its potential, I responded by grabbing for more, and especially by being selfish with my time.

Well, if you've seen that strange pattern show up in your life, and like me, you regret seeing it, then hear the good news. In Jesus, God gives us "forgiveness of sins". We don't have to keep repeating the same mistakes; we can have a new start. That's why I went to St. Anthony of Padua Parish today and confessed my sins to one of the good priest there, to one of the kind Franciscans. I wanted to get my new start. There's more good news, too. In Jesus, God gives us "wisdom and insight", so we can understand better the conflicting desires in our mixed-up human hearts, and live well in the midst of them. Most of all, the good news is the Kingdom of God. In Jesus, God gives us "every spiritual blessings in the heavens" so we "exist for the praise of God's glory", first in this life, then in heaven after death, and then in the new earth after the resurrection, forever and ever. This promise of the Kingdom, of heaven, of eternal life, really is one of the best parts of being a Christian. It is God's answer to our heart's deep desire for life, for more of this precious gift with so much potential.

Don't think for a moment, though, that the promise of the kingdom and our hope in heaven makes life here on earth less important, less precious, less rich with potential. Think of how Jesus sent out his Apostles: he sent them out two by two so they would cover more ground. He gave them to travel light and not to get bogged down. He knew their time on earth was precious. Life on earth is more precious when we know it heads towards heaven. For here on earth "grows the body of a new human family, a body which even now is able to give some foreshadowing of the new age." As human life here reflects God's Kingdom, people see it, and as they see it, they believe it, and as they seek it, and as they seek it, they will find it, eternal life in Christ Jesus.

By our days here on earth really we can contribute to the praise of God and other's eternal happiness. "For after we have obeyed the Lord, and in His Spirit nurtured on earth the values of human dignity, brotherhood and freedom, and indeed all the good fruits of our nature and enterprise, we will find them again, but freed of stain, burnished and transfigured, when Christ hands over to his Father: 'a kingdom eternal and universal". Therefore, our choices matter for the spread of the Lord's Kingdom. Therefore, generosity with our time is a powerful way to trust God. Sisters and brothers, I hope that God blesses your socks off this week, and that if he does, you respond better than I did last week.

Can you believe that summer is halfway over? It's so short, so precious—so much like life. Yet there is still time to do what we've anticipated, or perhaps, by God's grace, even more than we planned. There's time help someone with a troublesome task, to fill water balloons for the children next door, to call a grieving friend, to invite someone to church, to proclaim our trust in God by the way we live our lives. This week, I invite you to give time to someone you want to see in heaven.

GOD WILL GIVE YOU REST

Today's Gospel comes at a good time: Jesus says, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.". Fr. Aaron's homilies have been reflecting on the slower pace of summer, finding inspiration to think about what gives life value and meaning. Like summer, our lives are short and precious. We want to spend our time living life well by trusting the Lord and giving God some of our attention during rest time and even finding time in our busy schedules.

Some may say, I am always busy! Life can have many demands, caring for children, grandchildren, family, running errands, work, responsibilities around the home, doctors' appointments, volunteering, social events. Maybe you are the caregiver for a sick spouse, parent, child or someone who relies on you for their needs. It can be exhausting. Life's demands can make us feel like the disciples, we too can wish for relaxation or time for rejuvenation.

Jesus cares about us. Like the disciples he wants us to find time to rest and reflect on his presence in our lives.

We heard that the disciples served God through their daily activities and ministry, then they came back to Jesus. It is the same for us, it isn't how much we get done or what we accomplish; it is about our relationship with God, returning to him in prayer and reflection. T.S. Eliot says, "I have the experience of God's action in my life, but can miss its meaning because I don't give time to reflect."

It is my hope that we can all find time to spend with God. We may be busy, we may not have money to "getaway," but each day we can find a place, our own getaway spot in a comfy chair, on the porch step or a ride to a spot in nature; where we can sit and talk to the Lord, listen or just be present in the quiet. May we all listen to the Lord's call to "come away and rest for a while." Know that you are loved. God will give you rest and strength.

Our program continues and supplements the religious formation from parents, who are the first teachers of their children in the ways of the faith. We assist families in the areas of knowledge of the faith, beliefs and Christian life skills and religious practices, and strengthening the growing relationship with Jesus and his Church.



Saint Mary Mackillop Saint of the Day for July 19

Saint Mary MacKillop's Story

If Saint Mary MacKillop were alive today, she would be a household name. It's not that she sought the limelight. On the contrary, she simply wanted to serve the poor wherever she found them in her native Australia. But along the way, she managed to arouse the ire of some rather powerful churchmen. One even excommunicated her for a time.

Born in Melbourne in 1842, to parents who had emigrated from Scotland, Mary grew up in a family that faced constant financial struggles. As a young woman she was drawn to religious life but could not find an existing order of Sisters that met her needs. In 1860, she met Father Julian Woods, who became her spiritual director. Together they founded a new community of women—the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Sacred Heart, also known as the Josephite Sisters. Its members were to staff schools especially for poor children, as well as orphanages, and do other works of charity.

As the congregation grew, so did Mary MacKillop's problems. Her priest-friend proved unreliable in many ways and his responsibilities for direction of the Sisters were removed. Meanwhile, Mary had the support of some local bishops as she and her Sisters went about their work. But the bishop in South Australia, aging and relying on others for advice, briefly excommunicated Mary—charging her with disobedience—and dispensed 50 of her Sisters from their vows. In truth, the bishop's quarrel was about power and who had authority over whom. He ultimately rescinded his order of excommunication.

Mary insisted that her congregation should be governed by an elected mother general answerable to Rome, not to the local bishop. There also were disputes about whether or not the congregation could own property. In the end, Rome proved to be Mary's best source of support. After a long wait official approval of the congregation—and how it was to be governed—came from Pope Leo XIII.

Despite her struggles with Church authorities, Mary MacKillop and her Sisters were able to offer social services that few, if any, government agencies in Australia could. They served Protestants and Catholics alike. They worked among the aborigines. They taught in schools and orphanages and served unmarried mothers.


Money, actually the lack of it, was a constant worry. But the Sisters who begged from door to door, were bolstered by faith and by the conviction that their struggles were opportunities to grow closer to God.

By the time Mary was approaching the end of her life, the congregation was thriving. She died in 1909 at the age of 67. Pope John Paul II beatified her in 1995. In 2010, when Pope Benedict XVI canonized her, she became Australia's first saint. Her liturgical feast is celebrated on August 8.

Reflection

The story of many foundresses of religious communities and the tales of the early days of those communities can make for fascinating reading. Those women were dedicated and tough and fought for those they served. Let's thank the Lord for raising up such wonderful examples of faith.


