To the Faithful of the Archdiocese of St. Louis,



We must all be deeply saddened by the devastation our brothers and sisters living along flooded rivers in our community are realizing, now that the near all-time historic high waters are receding. After an initial assessment, sever-

al hundred households mostly in St. Charles and Lincoln Counties have been affected with major damage or a complete loss. I ask the Lord to carry those who are suffering and who have lost so much.

To help provide immediate and long-term aid to those impacted by this most recent natural disaster, I am asking our nearly 200 parishes in 11 counties to participate in a second collection at all Masses this weekend or the weekend after (July 13 -14 or **July 20-21**). Saint of the Week



Saint Kateri Tekakwitha's Story Feast Day, July 14th

The blood of martyrs is the seed of saints. Nine years after the

Jesuits Isaac Jogues and Jean de Lelande were tomahawked by Iroquois warriors, a baby girl was born near the place of their martyrdom, Auriesville, New York.

Her mother was a Christian Algonquin, taken captive by the Iroquois and given as wife to the chief of the Mohawk clan, the boldest and fiercest of the Five Nations. When she was four, Tekakwitha lost her parents and little brother in a smallpox epidemic that left her disfigured and half blind. She was adopted by an uncle, who succeeded her father as chief. He hated the coming of the Blackrobes -Jesuit missionaries - but could do nothing to them because a peace treaty with the French required their presence in villages with Christian captives. She was moved by the words of three Blackrobes who lodged with her uncle, but fear of him kept her from seeking instruction. Tekakwitha refused to marry a Mohawk brave, and at 19 finally got the courage to take the step of converting. She was baptized with the name Kateri - Catherine - on Easter Sunday.

Now she would be treated as a slave. Because she would not work on Sunday, Kateri received no food that day. Her life in grace grew rapidly. She told a missionary that she often meditated on the great dignity of being baptized. She was powerfully moved by God's love for human beings and saw the dignity of each of her people.

She was always in danger, for her conversion and holy life created great opposition. On the advice of a priest, Kateri stole away one night and began a 200 - mile walking journey to a Christian Indian village at Sault St. Louis, near Montreal.


For three years she grew in holiness under the direction of a priest and an older Iroquois woman, giving herself totally to God in long hours of prayer, in charity, and in strenuous penance. At 23, Kateri took a vow of virginity, an unprecedented act for an Indian woman whose future depended on being married. She found a place in the woods where she could pray an hour a day - and was accused of meeting a man there!

Her dedication to virginity was instinctive: Kateri did not know about religious life for women until she visited Montreal. Inspired by this, she and two friends wanted to start a community, but the local priest dissuaded her. She humbly accepted an "ordinary" life. She practiced extremely severe fasting as penance for the conversion of her nation. Kateri Tekakwitha died the afternoon before Holy Thursday. Witnesses said that her emaciated face changed color and became like that of a healthy child. The lines of suffering, even the pockmarks, disappeared and the touch of a smile came upon her lips. She was beatified in 1980 and canonized in 2012.

Reflection

We like to think that our proposed holiness is thwarted by our situation. If only we could have more solitude, less opposition, better health. Kateri Tekakwitha repeats the example of the saints: Holiness thrives on the cross, anywhere. Yet she did have what Christians - all people -need: the support of a community. She had a good mother, helpful priests, Christian friends. These were present in what we call primitive conditions, and blossomed in the age-old Christian triad of prayer, fasting and almsgiving: union with God in Jesus and the Spirit, self-discipline and often suffering, and charity for her brothers and sisters.

THE GOOD SAMARITAN

Many times, we have heard the story of the Good Samaritan. We may not give it much attention, because we "know" the story. Yet, how does the story resonate in you personally?

A lawyer tried to test Jesus by asking the question, "Who is properly qualified to receive eternal life?" Jesus asked him, "What is written in the law?' The lawyer said, "You shall love the Lord, your God with all you heart, with all your being, with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbor as yourself."

This is where the challenge begins. Who is the neighbor? Jesus offered him the Good Samaritan parable.

The priest and the Levite in the story walk by the man probably because they think he is dead and according to Mosaic law, you can't worship in the temple if you've touched a dead body. Walking by was the safest thing for them to do. The third man was from Samaria, Samarians were despised by the Jews because they didn't practice the true religion. The Samarian risked impurity to help this beaten man. He was moved with compassion and mercy.

Those who were respected, wealthy, educated and religious failed to help the person in need. Contrary to expectation, it was the despised Samaritan turned out to be the real neighbor, the one who gave mercy.

Jesus asked the lawyer who of the three men was a neighbor to the one beaten and left for dead; he answered "the one who had compassion."

With this parable, Jesus changed perspective of the lawyer. He delivers the same message to us today.

Jesus is telling us that when it comes to loving our neighbors, we must be inclusiveness of everyone as our neighbor - not just those who look, act or believe the same. There are no rules, no boundaries, and no cultural taboos that should inhibit us from loving those in need. The law of love is greater than the law of piety; of rules of conduct.

In an article by the Catholic News Agency, Pope Francis cautioned that we must not "catalogue others to decide who is my neighbor and who isn't," explaining that being a neighbor entails adopting the same attitude as the Samaritan toward the people we meet who need help, even if they are a stranger or even hostile."

The Pope then pointed out that Jesus tells his disciples to "go, and also you do the same." The Pope said, that Jesus repeats the same commandment to each one of us: "go and do the same, be a neighbor to the brother and sister you see in difficulty, whether they are a stranger, a migrant, elderly or sick."

"Lord, help me to consistently be aware of your commandment to love You and to love my neighbor as myself. Help me to love all neighbors without distinction and help me to be a compassionate, merciful neighbor even when it is inconvenient or when life is busy. Amen. "
