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I thought you should know – February 7, 2021

Last week I shared with you that I thought the most important thing we can do right now as a parish to fulfill the mission Jesus gave us is to become **a growing parish of growing disciples**. Why do I think that is the most important task right here right now? Most of all because Jesus told us to make disciples. In Matthew chapter 28 verse 19, Jesus says, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations." Another reason I think that this is our most important task is that our average weekend congregation declined 16%, from 534 to 370, in the years 2015 to 2019.

Also, I think that our parish really could grow! We live in a great neighborhood. There were 100 more people in our neighborhood in 2015 than in 2000. Our neighborhood is getting younger: our neighborhood's biggest age cohort is people 25-34 years old. Think of the difference we can make if we help those young people meet Jesus! And while most parishes in St. Louis shrank in 2015-2019, during those same years a few parishes grew little by little. Why not us, too?

I know that the closing of the Immaculate Heart of Mary School was a really hard moment for a lot of people in our parish. That makes sense to me. But I respectfully suggest that the problem we face in a declining congregation is not a "no school" problem. If you take a look at our neighboring parishes with schools, in 2015-2019, when our parish shrunk 16%, the average congregation size declined at St. Stephen Protomartyr by 15%, at St. Raphael by 19%, and at St. Mark by 30%.

A good priest wrote: "How do we make our parish church grow? Wrong question. We don't make it grow; only God does. 'The question we need to ask instead is, "what is keeping our church from growing?"" So we've asked everyone to pray a novena for our parish, so we can know how to work with the Lord and change what he wants us to change. God bless you!

Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful, and enkindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit, and they shall be created, and you shall renew the face of the earth.

Lord Jesus, grant we pray, to each of us at Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish, the Spirit's gifts of wisdom, counsel, and fortitude, so that we may find our next steps to serve you, and persevere in them.

God our Father, pour out the gifts of your Holy Spirit on the world. You send the Spirit on your Church to begin the teaching of the Gospel: now let the Spirit continue the work in the world in the hearts of all who believe. We ask this through Christ our Lord, Amen.

Immaculate Heart of Mary, pray for us.

<Short pantomime> Fr. Craig at DeSmet was famous for doing homilies by mime! Preach the gospel always, use mimes when necessary, I suppose. I His silent mimed homilies always got my attention. However, if you see our church on fire, please don't come to the rectory and do charades. Steam—incense—smoke—church—fire—something on fire—me—your. "Your church is on fire." Instead, if you know what I need to know, please use words!

We are in week two of a series of messages called "Use words when necessary". We're learning about times when we can really help others by our words, times when our words are necessary. One time when our words are necessary is when we know something that someone else needs to know. Simple idea, right? Yet this simple idea might be the most challenging idea of this series. For we know things and others need to know things, not only about our physical

world, its possibilities and its dangers, but also about the spiritual world. To start a conversation with someone about the mind and heart and will and soul, to start a conversation about right and wrong or how someone relates to God or treats others, that can be scary.

Yet the Gospel today reminded us that Jesus taught with authority. He gave us wisdom about the spiritual things. He gave us that wisdom not only to help us, but also that by sharing his wisdom, we might help others. You see, the Lord Jesus loves to work with and through us. He loves to work through the members of his mystical Body, all of us, the Church. So there will be times when the Lord shares with you a message he wants someone else to know. <Pause>

If you see someone's anger destroying their family little by little—if you meet someone weighed down by guilt over an accident or illness that was not their fault—if a friend is dating someone who will just do harm—if drinking is worse and worse and more and more—if someone disheartened and discouraged has so many gifts and such great potential—or if someone is chasing happiness on a path you know leads to heartbreak—if you know something that someone else needs to know, could it be that the Lord has raised you up for that moment to put his words in your mouth? When the ancient Israelites asked the Lord to speak through human mediators, the Lord replied "This was well said. I will raise up a prophet ... for them; I will put my words in his mouth".

Often people think of prophecy as foretelling the future. But in the Bible, when a prophet foretold the future, that foretelling was for the sake of some change in the present. The Lord wanted people to believe or do or choose some-thing in that moment. Prophecy is not at its core about telling the future. Prophecy is the spiritual gift to tell someone something about their present situation that the Lord wants them to know.

If you're like me, the idea of being a prophet is more frightening than inspiring. To help with the fear, you can be humble and ask the Lord if he wants you to speak. Then, if the answer is yes, you can be humble again and tell the Lord that he has to show you what he wants you to say. But don't let fear paralyze you, or blind you to the good that could come. Your words could turn someone from a danger or open someone to a possibility which they had never considered. Your words, or really, God's word coming through you, could plant a seed that grows up glorious or change the arc of a life.

When you become convinced that the Lord wants you to speak, you don't have to wait till you have the perfect words to say. Often that's never going to happen; or at least, you're never going to feel perfectly ready. Instead, pray and then start the conversation.

When you can, it's good to take time to set up the conversation, to pray about what words or images or stories might help the person understand and might give them hope. Take time to figure out the good news and the hope they can have in Jesus Christ. At other times, you'll know that you only have a short time to speak, that this moment is the opportunity and it is passing. Even then, pray. An unobtrusive way to fit in a prayer when time is of the essence is to slow down your words and use that delay to fire off to the Holy Spirit a quick prayer in your heart. Sometimes, even when the situation arose spontaneously, it is ok just to ask the person if you can have a moment to pray.

Remember, the plan is to pray and then start a conversation. So, be ready to listen. As the conversation gets going, it can be very helpful to make yourself, to discipline yourself, before you make your point or reply, to repeat back first what you heard the other person say, in the most accurate, sympathetic, and persuasive way you can. You want to make back to them the same point they made to you, and say it even better than they did. This shows respect and built trust. Also, it helps you check if you have understood them correctly and helps you pay attention to the part of the conversation that is most important to them. Most of all, this discipline pushes you to really think about them and what they are saying, rather than just what you feel and what's going on inside your head. Finally, somewhere in the conversation somehow, give the person not only information, but also, hope. Express to them why you have hope, why your faith in Jesus gives you hope for them.

This week, let's try to practice something basic: slowing conversations down and setting conversations up. I invite you this week to pray, then speak.

Complain, Complain, Complain!

I think we can relate with Job in our First Reading. He laments of his suffering with bitter complaining about his life. Job's children have all died, his wealth was stolen, he has sores all over his body, he works hard, he has trouble sleeping, life is difficult to say the least, he is losing hope, he is beginning to wonder "What if we die and that's it?!"

This past year with the pandemic and other sufferings we have endured connects us with Job. We find ourselves, our family, friends and our world with the similar complaints, anxiety, exhaustion and frustrations. We too long for our lives to be free of suffering.

We want to be free of suffering, yet we do not want to look at everything that is causing our pain and sadness. We long for answers, comfort, rest and hope. People we know and care about may have desperation and suffering in their lives. How do we help ourselves? How do we help others? As Job asked, "Is not man's life on earth a drudgery?"

Asking these questions may be uncomfortable. However, that is exactly where we start. Pretending all is well and avoiding struggles, will only cause more suffering. Bring all of your pain, worry, exhaustion and doubt to the Lord. It cannot end there. Use this time of questioning to bring you closer to Jesus, to seek his guidance, to find answers, hope and comfort. This is no time for sugar coating and politeness. Be honest, be real, allow your true feelings, emotions, tears, anger, fear.... Jesus wants you to come as you are. Do not wait for the "perfect moment." Pray from your heart.

As Christians, we believe goodness, love and life will prevail. It doesn't mean life will be easy or be perfect, without suffering. We find our hope in Jesus. Jesus's suffering and death on the cross happened for us. That we may find meaning, learning and persevering through our trials, with the confidence that Jesus is with us every step of the way and that when are days on earth come to an end, it is not a punishment, it is a reward, a continuation.

May your prayer time and your faith light the way for you and for the people in your life. God may be calling you to use your words to bring hope.

"Lord, bless my prayer time that I may speak freely, that I will be keenly aware of your presence, guidance and hope. If there is someone who is in need of your hope, help me to use the words you would have me say. Amen."

Saint Apollonia's Story

The persecution of Christians began in Alexandria during the reign of the Emperor Philip. The first victim of the pagan mob was an old man named Metrius, who was tortured and then stoned to death. The second person who refused to worship their false idols was a Christian woman named Quinta. Her words infuriated the mob and she was scourged and stoned.

While most of the Christians were fleeing the city, abandoning all their worldly possessions, an old deaconess, Apollonia, was seized. The crowds beat her, knocking out all of her teeth. Then they lit a large fire and threatened to throw her in it if she did not curse her God. She begged them to wait a moment, acting as if she was considering their requests. Instead, she jumped willingly into the flames and so suffered martyrdom.

There were many churches and altars dedicated to her. Apollonia is the patroness of dentists, and people suffering from toothache and other dental diseases often ask her intercession. She is pictured with a pair of pincers holding a tooth or with a golden tooth suspended from her necklace. Saint Augustine explained her voluntary martyrdom as a special inspiration of the Holy Spirit, since no one is allowed to cause his or her own death.

Reflection

The Church has quite a sense of humor! Apollo-

nia is honored as the patron saint of dentists, but this woman who had her teeth extracted without anesthetic surely ought to be the patron of those who dread the chair. She might also be the patron of the aging, for she attained glory in her old age, standing firm before her persecutors even as her fellow Christians fled the city. However we choose to honor her, she remains a model of courage for us.


