Fr. Nord's Homily-July 4, 2021

Happy Fourth of July, everyone! I'd like to dive right into the Gospel we just heard, because I think it has a connection to this Fourth of July Independence Day, and also to "Live It Well", our current homily series on life and summer.

In today's Gospel Jesus goes back to his hometown and had a bad day. It's a bit of a disaster. The people he grew up with reject him and his message. In Luke's Gospel, Luke mentions that Jesus' old neighbors got so angry they tried to throw him out of town, literally. What a bad day. No one had faith; it seemed like nothing good was happening; Jesus worked no mighty deeds "apart from curing a few sick people by laying his hands on them."

Whoa, whoa—let's rewind for a moment—what was that last part? "He was not able to do any might deed there, apart from curing a few sick people by laying his hands on them." On this "bad day" where nothing went well, JESUS WORKED MIRACLES and cured people who were sick. How's that for a perspective adjustor? Yes, it had been a bad day. The Gospel says that Jesus was amazed by their lack of faith. But even on this "bad day" Jesus was still the Father's Son, with blessing from the Father that really blessed others.

So there's the connection between Jesus in his hometown and us on the Fourth of July, 2021. It's a perspective adjustor. While I haven't talked to many people recently who enthusiastically tell me the United States of America is really doing great; while people from many different perspectives have told me about a way we're headed in the wrong direction and some "bad days" our nation has had recently, still, if we pause and think on this fourth of July, about our nation and our independence, we have some blessings.

We have freedom to discuss and to listen. We have freedom to meet and to vote. We have freedom to shape the direction of our nation. And we have other blessings, too, prosperity in various ways. We have *many* blessings from God. Well, on Jesus' bad day, he still was and he still lived as the Son of his Heavenly Father, and the blessings he had, he made them count for others. Then, though our past and present problems humble us, as citizens we still have a choice before us. Will we hunker down and use our freedoms, our prosperity, and our blessings just to make things a good as we can for ourselves for as long as we can? Or will be live as citizens of heaven, as daughters and sons of God the Father, as Jesus did, and make our blessings count for others?

Indeed, if you'll think even a little deeper yet with me, I think we can see the lesson of Jesus' humbling day in his home town is a lesson not only for Fourth of July 2021, but for many times in live, vacation, or summer. We can call that lesson "the value of humility". Humility is the virtue, the strength on the inside, that keeps us in touch with the truth about ourselves, good and bad, and leads us to serve others because the truth about them is that they are important to God. Humility makes us admit our flaws and weaknesses. Humility reminds us that we have "bad days", moments that are hard and disappointing. Yet if we remember Jesus and the people he helped in his hometown of Nazareth, humility makes us not only honest, but also hopeful. For the same humility that points out to us our many problems points out to us also that God the Creator has become the Lord our Savior, that he really does love us, and that he has given us many blessings. So because the Lord says, "my power is made perfect in weakness", we can say, "When I am weak, then I am strong".

Whether we're talking about life or summer or vacation or this Fourth of July, as individuals and as a na-

tion, the way to live it well, I suggest, is to live as Jesus did, as daughters and sons of God, with patience for our neighbors and compassion for our afflicted, blessing them with our blessings. What if you started thinking about which of your blessings you could share with someone else when they are having a bad day? Maybe you could make a list of toys you have you could share with someone else to cheer them up. What if you took time to ask someone relevant questions about a topic that interested them, and really listened to the answers? What if you set aside a dime or a dollar for people in a poor country every time you heard someone pontificate on politics in our country? Well, all these are just suggestions to get you thinking, and maybe they are too complicated. Because what I want to invite you to do this week is to express your trust in Jesus in a simple way. This week, when you hit your hard moment or your bad day, look for a blessing you have that can bless others.

Saint of the Week



Saint Francis Solano Saint of the Day for July 17

Saint Francis Solano's Story

Francis came from a leading family in Andalusia, Spain. Perhaps it was his popularity as a student that enabled Francis in his teens to stop two duelists. He entered the Friars Minor in 1570, and after ordination enthusiastically sacrificed himself for others. His care for the sick during an epidemic drew so much admiration that he became embarrassed and asked to be sent to the African missions. Instead he was sent to South America in 1589.

While working in what is now Argentina, Bolivia, and Paraguay, Francis quickly learned the local languages and was well received by the indigenous peoples. His visits to the sick often included playing a song on his violin.

Around 1601, he was called to Lima, Peru, where he tried to recall the Spanish colonists to their baptismal integrity. Francis also worked to defend the indigenous peoples from oppression. He died in Lima in 1610 and was canonized in 1726. His liturgical feast is celebrated on July 14.

Reflection

Francis Solano knew from experience that the lives of Christians sometimes greatly hinder the spread of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Francis lived an exemplary life himself, and urged his fellow Spaniards to make their lives worthy of their baptisms.


