### I thought you should know - October 4, 2020

Here's the latest installment from last week's homily in our "Overflowing" homily series. God bless you!

On May 7th, 1864, the bloodied soldiers of the Army of the Potomac heard their reserve artillery and their supply wagons pack up and pull away from Battle of the Wilderness. They were ready to retreat, for they had just seen happen again what had always happened before. A new general had arrived—General Grant—and he had built up the army, then led them headed south toward the Confederate capitol. He had been intercepted by General Lee. He had lost seventeen thousand men in two days fighting with nothing to show for it.

As the tired Union soldiers pulled out of the line division by division, they expected Grant to do what every general before him had done, to take them north in retreat, to safety and defeat. But instead, Grant went south. In the weeks that followed, Grant got stopped again and again, blocked by Lee in bloody and indecisive battles at Spotsylvania Court House, North Anna, and Cold Harbor. But after every battle, Grant led his soldiers further south. By June 1964, they had the Confederates under siege. By April 9, 1865, Lee surrendered to Grant. Why was Grant different than all the generals that had before him? One reason was that Grant knew that he had behind him the will of the President, the might of the Union economy, and the resolve of countless citizens that the Union would not break, nor slavery prevail. So Grant's failures did not stop him. Grant knew he could get another chance.

Brothers and sisters, we're in the third week of a homily series called Overflowing. Week by week, we are learning how faith in Jesus can let you live in a way that most people don't and most people can't, but you can, from God's love overflowing. Today's Gospel message is powerful. It's a message that let people to break free from sin it's a message that lets people escape slavery. It can give you the confidence that General Grant had. The message is: "You can get another chance." You can go right where you had always messed up before; you can receive again what you had lost; you can prevail where you had always before been defeated; you can get another chance.

In today's Gospel, Jesus told the chief priest and the elders, "tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kingdom of God before you." So let's think for a moment about what those words mean. Who were tax collectors? Who were prostitutes?

Tax collectors back then were not like the staff of the IRS today. They were not civil servants. Back then, tax collectors were the next thing to robbers, because tax collectors would take as much as they could grab and keep all the extra they could take, all backed by the might of the Roman Army, as long as the Empire got its cut. I bet you would feel terrible if you stole from a store—then how far down would someone have to fall to steal systematically from all their neighbors? Tax collectors were deep in sin, trapped by sin, lost with no way home—but they discovered they could enter the kingdom of God. They found that they could make right what they had done and make it back into the community and hope to heaven by putting their faith in Jesus. With faith in Jesus, they could get another chance.

By contrast, prostitutes back then were like prostitutes today. These poor people ensnared in prostitution were more or less slaves, trapped by those who controlled them, sold to men blind to the wrath of God that falls on those who exploit others sexually. Even today, it's hard to break free of human trafficking; life in in first century Palestine was even harsher. Who could expect that life would ever be different for these poor people? They had been tricked and broken and wounded and harmed—but they discovered they could enter the kingdom of God. They found they could get free from their oppressors and released from their demons and healed from their wounds, and have hope and eternal life ahead of them by putting their faith in Jesus. With faith in Jesus, they could get another chance.

The same possibility is open in front of us today. One of the priests who helped me the most was a man who lost his way in alcoholism and spent years away from ministry. But by God's mercy he got another chance, and became a great priest. One of the married couples I know had separated and sold their house in preparation for divorce, their family was broken and for one of them, their love had died, but they got another chance. Their love came back, and with a lot of help from other Catholics they found a way to work through all the problems that seemed so insurmountable, and are living as a family again and happy today. Thanks be to God, in big ways and in little ones, you and I by faith in Jesus can get another chance.

But brothers and sisters, Jesus had a reason for telling the chief priest and elders, "Tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kingdom of God before you", and it's a reason you and I should also heed. Also for the chief priest and elders, also for us, there is open before us the possibility of getting another chance. But we have to choose it. General Grant had to choose to go south. The tax collectors had to choose to do business differently. The prostitutes had to choose to come to Jesus. If we want the gifts of faith, we have to choose to listen to Jesus, to take risks because we are willing to believe him, to do what we hear him say. So I want to invite you this week to make that choice in a real and practical way. Think of a good resolution you made in the past; I mean a good idea that you had in the past and that you set out to do. Think of a good resolution you made in the past, one you wish you had kept. Choose to take it up again.

Can you imagine what it would be like to have a heart not stuck in a rut, but headed towards victory? With faith in Jesus, that can be you. You can get another chance, by God's love overflowing.

- Trems should still be brought to the school building through the door across from the rectory.



## Saint of the Week



Saint Bruno
Saint of the Day for October 6

### Saint Bruno's Story

This saint has the honor of having founded a religious order which, as the saying goes, has never had to be reformed because it was never deformed. No doubt both the founder and the members would reject such high praise, but it is an indication of the saint's intense love of a penitential life in solitude.

Bruno was born in Cologne, Germany, became a famous teacher at Rheims, and was appointed chancellor of the archdiocese at the age of 45. He supported Pope Gregory VII in his fight against the decadence of the clergy, and took part in the removal of his own scandalous archbishop, Manasses. Bruno suffered the plundering of his house for his pains.

He had a dream of living in solitude and prayer, and persuaded a few friends to join him in a hermitage. After a while he felt the place unsuitable and through a friend, was given some land which was to become famous for his foundation "in the Chartreuse"—from which comes the word Carthusians. The climate, desert, mountainous terrain, and inaccessibility guaranteed silence, poverty, and small numbers.

Bruno and his friends built an oratory with small individual cells at a distance from each other. They met for Matins and Vespers each day and spent the rest of the time in solitude, eating together only on great feasts. Their chief work was copying manuscripts.

Hearing of Bruno's holiness, the pope called for

his assistance in Rome. When the pope had to flee Rome, Bruno pulled up stakes again, and after refusing a bishopric, spent his last years in the wilderness of Calabria.

Bruno was never formally canonized, because the Carthusians were averse to all occasions of publicity. However, Pope Clement X extended his feast to the whole Church in 1674.

### Reflection

If there is always a certain uneasy questioning of the contemplative life, there is an even greater puzzlement about the extremely penitential combination of community and hermit life lived by the Carthusians. May we mirror Bruno's quest for holiness and unity with God.


