I thought you should know – July 4, 2021

Happy Fourth of July! I hope that you have some time this weekend to reflect on the many blessings our country has and how we can better use those blessings for God's purposes. God is good!

We're making some changes here at Immaculate Heart of Mary for the sake of freeing up energy and resources for our mission. The first change is a small one: we're no longer going to have the parish office open on Wednesdays. Having our staff spend less time keeping the office open will allow our staff to spend more time visiting our parishioners who are homebound or in nursing homes. It will also let our staff spend more time on improving our weekend worship. So, starting this week, our new office hours are Monday, Tuesday and Thursday from 9 am to 4 pm.

The second change is bigger, a new policy on fundraising at Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish. Starting July 1, 2021, all fundraising at our parish or by a parish organization needs prior approval from me at least a month in advance. This policy applies to all fundraisers, both those asking for money and those asking for donated goods. This policy applies to all fundraisers, both those we've always done and also new ideas.

I want our parish to be a growing parish of growing disciples. Fundraising has the potential to harm our growth. Therefore, we need to evaluate each proposed fundraiser carefully.

Why does fundraising have potential to harm our growth? Let me share with you my view.

First, we want to show new people who show up on Sunday that what we care about is Jesus, his love for them, and his mission. Every fundraiser risks giving our guests the impression that what we care about is not the life-changing message of Jesus Christ, but separating people from their money. For someone new here, weekend worship should be about what Jesus gives them, not about what we ask them to give us. Fundraising is bad for making disciples.

Second, we want people who come here week after week to grow as disciples, and part of discipleship is service. So we want to challenge people to say "Yes" to committed, significant service. Certainly, committed significant service can be humble and hidden. Chi Light helps us pray through the beautiful flowers she arranges for Jesus in our sanctuary. Dolores Taylor makes us feel welcome by giving us a beautiful garden where we can visit after church. Susan Caruso and our Altar Society make Christmas and Easter beautiful celebrations year after year. Though humble and hidden, their service directly changes lives, helps others, and proclaims the gospel. It's committed and significant. When someone here at Immaculate Heart of Mary gets the Holy Spirit's fire, we want them to think of that sort of service. We want them to join our hospitality team, or volunteer to start a nursery, or visit the sick, or go to the homeless, or become a parish leader. When someone is thinking, "The Lord is so good. What can I do for him?" we don't want them to think, "I know! I'll start a fundraiser," much less, "I'll buy a ticket." Fundraising is bad for growing disciples.

Third, our parish budget lives or dies based on the worship offerings people make at weekend worship—I mean, the money people give online or in the collection basket. What lets us do all the good we do? Those remarkable freewill offerings given just because people trust Jesus and love God. Those offerings express faith and grow faith. If freewill offering decreases, fundraising will never close the gap. Even worse, each time we ask someone to support a fundraiser, we make it harder for them to hear the Lord asking them to trust him and love others and make a free will offering at worship. Fundraising is bad for our budget.

However, parish leaders I respect have told me that they think some fundraising is welcome and understood by visitors, especially when it's for those in need. Parish leaders I respect have told me that they think some fundraising occurs at enjoyable events people look forward to each year. So, though I'm allergic to fundraising, I'm willing to consider fundraisers. © I'm certainly willing to consider your thoughts or a fundraiser important to you. But fundraisers need to fit our parish's mission, vision, and strategy. That means we can't say

yes to everything, and we can't say yes to anything by default.

The second installment of "Live it Well" is below. God bless you!

Welcome back for the second week of "Live it Well", our homily series on life and summer. Life and summer: they are short, and they are precious. How do we live it well?

Some people I respect live vacation well by relaxing; their perfect day is a slow day on the beach, with a slow morning, an extra nap, some good food, and no plans. For me, though, I go on vacation with lots of things I want to do. So a few years ago, when I arrived at my cousins for a week of vacation, I had big plans, plans my cousin Charlie interrupted when he said he wanted to make a board game. Now at that time, Charlie was about 9 years old. He knew I liked board games, he knew that his brother Xavier and I had worked on a board game together some years back, but Charlie had no idea how much time it takes to design from scratch a board game, and I had no intention of letting Charlie's idea interrupt my plans.

But then the Holy Spirit poked me, so I noticed how excited Charlie was, and how this interruption could be an opportunity. So I said yes, and I taught Charlie a little bit about brainstorming, and made him do way more work than he had planned, and we designed a board game. Lots of people joined in the fun, and together we made a board game called "Dungeon Seekers". There's only one copy in existence, the one made of cardboard and improvised materials in my aunt's basement, but we like it so well that we play it almost every time I see his family. I know the Holy Spirit really helped me that vacation, because usually I don't respond so well to life's interruptions.

Interruptions are a fact of life. "Life is what happens while you make other plans", as the saying goes. But in the moments when we feel how short life is, now precious life is, when it is summer or vacation or just a busy day, when there is so much we want to do or so much we have to do, interruptions can make it very hard to live it well. Today in the Gospel, we heard a story about a busy man, a synagogue official—who faced a terrible interruption when his daughter's life was interrupted by an illness that took her to the point of death.

So the busy man interrupted, interrupted someone else. He interrupted Jesus, who was also having a busy day, who was teaching a big crowd that had met Jesus the moment he got off the boat. The interrupted man interrupted Jesus and urgently asked him to come heal his daughter. And Jesus responded well, stopping what he was going, and coming with the desperate man.

But on the way there, the man's interrupted life is interrupted again, when a sick woman sneaks up to Jesus in the crowd and tries to squeeze in one more healing. Jesus also responds well to this interruption, taking time to meet the woman and to encourage her faith. When they are finally about to get moving, the man's life is interrupted one more time, with a terrible interruption, by a messenger with news from his home: "Your daughter has died. Why trouble the teacher any longer?" <Pause>

Imagine how that man felt. Try to get inside his head. He had been so close; he had Jesus on the way with healing. There had just been one too many interrupted. Still, "life is what happens when you make other plans." If you had been him, in that moment, how would that "fact of life" feel to you? <Pause>

Then you hear the voice of Jesus, speaking right to you, telling you how to live it well, your terribly interrupted life: "Do not be afraid, just have faith" (Mark 5:36). What would you do?

To his credit, the man did what Jesus said. He didn't go ballistic and start shouting at the woman who had interrupted them and cost his daughter her chance for healing. He doesn't curse God and give up hope. He doesn't do what I tend to do, when my plans get interrupted, and go off and waste a bunch of life and time looking for distractions in entertainment or pleasure. Instead, he does what Jesus said—imperfectly, grieving, struggling, sure—but he does it. He has faith, and brings Jesus the rest of the way to his home. There he sees Jesus put out all the mourners, ignoring their mockery. He hears Jesus say, "little girl, arise" (Mark 5:41). He sees Jesus interrupt his daughter's sleep of death and take her hand and raise her up to health and life, to continue what death had interrupted.

That man learned that day how to live life well with its interruptions, and Jesus' disciples passed on this story so we could learn the lesson, too. Faith lets the Lord lead us through life's interruptions. To live it well, trust God.

You see, God had told us that he desires us to flourish in these short precious lives he gave each of us. We heard his teaching in the book of Wisdom: "God did not make death, nor does he rejoice in the destruction of the living. For he fashioned all things that they might have being" (Wisdom 1:13-14). Still, God is more powerful than the devil. God can forgive us when we sin and lead us back home, out of the devil's company. God the Father provides for our flourishing, our forgiveness, our life, and our journey home to him in the life of Jesus his Son. In Jesus' life, we see how God's deeds fit God's words. The God who says he desires our flourishing works miracles of healing and resurrection to accomplish it.

That's why it makes sense to trust God. And that's why when we do trust God, faith opens up new possibilities for us, including the possibility of living life well despite life's interruptions. Human wisdom says, "life is what happens while you make other plans", and human wisdom is not wrong, because life does have surprises and interruptions. But faith sees deeper, and says with Proverbs, chapter 16 verse 9, "Human heart's make plans, but the Lord directs the steps". And faith knows that God is directing our steps for our good.

To live life and summer well when they're interrupted, to live with peace and hope and patience, looking forward to blessings, remember that even interruptions are under God's power, and he can make them work to his purposes. So I invite you this week to live your faith in a very simple way. Look for the opportunity in something unexpected.

For years, I have had an appreciation for this week's Gospel Mark 6:1-6. This Gospel tells us that Jesus wasn't able to perform miracles in Nazareth, the way he had Galilee and other locations, because the lack of faith by those in His hometown. Jesus is said to be greatly surprised by this. He didn't see this rejection coming. This allows us to see a connection to Jesus's very human side. Just like us, Jesus experienced rejection. Rejection is frustrating and painful.

Jesus said to them, "Prophets are respected everywhere except in their own hometown and by their relatives and their family." There may be reasons why rejection occurs, but it doesn't take away the sting.

Can you identify with Jesus? Have you felt rejected? Are there people in your life that you want to help? Possibly they need guidance or support, maybe you would you like to share your faith and help them to know Jesus, you may have wisdom you would like to provide. Mark 6:1-6 reveals, we can turn to Jesus, when this happens. He understands.

We can pray, "Lord, I have something weighing on my heart. I know you had problems. I know you felt the pain of reject. I am feeling that pain. I do not know what to do or what not to do. I only want to want, to love and to do your will. I am trusting you to guide my words, actions, heart and hearing, so that I may do your will! Lord, I trust you. Please let those in need to be open to your presence. Amen."

Saint Maria Goretti Saint of the Day for July 6

Saint Maria Goretti's Story

One of the largest crowds ever assembled for a canonization—250,000—symbolized the reaction of millions touched by the simple story of Maria Goretti. She was the daughter of a poor Italian tenant farmer, had no chance to go to school, never learned to read or write. When Maria made her First Communion not long before her death, she was one of the larger and somewhat backward members of the class.

On a hot afternoon in July, Maria was sitting at the top of the stairs of her house, mending a shirt. She was not quite 12 years old, but physically mature. A cart stopped outside, and a neighbor, 18-year-old Alessandro, ran up the stairs. He seized her and pulled her into a bedroom. She struggled and tried to call for help. "No, God does not wish it," she cried out. "It is a sin. You would go to hell for it." Alessandro began striking at her blindly with a long dagger.

Maria was taken to a hospital. Her last hours were marked by the usual simple compassion of the good—concern about where her mother would sleep, forgiveness of her murderer (she had been in fear of him, but did not say anything lest she cause trouble to his family), and her devout welcoming of Viaticum, her last Holy Communion. She died about 24 hours after the attack.

Alessandro was sentenced to 30 years in prison. For a long time he was unrepentant and surly. One night he had a dream or vision of Maria gathering flowers and offering them to him. His life changed. When

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he was released after 27 years, his first act was to beg the forgiveness of Maria's mother.

Devotion to the young martyr grew, miracles were worked, and in less than half a century she was canonized. At her beatification in 1947, her 82-year-old mother, two sisters, and her brother appeared with Pope Pius XII on the balcony of St. Peter's. Three years later, at Maria's canonization, a 66-year-old Alessandro Serenelli knelt among the quarter-million people and cried tears of joy.

Reflection

Maria may have had trouble with catechism, but she had no trouble with faith. God's will was holiness, decency, respect for one's body, absolute obedience, total trust. In a complex world, her faith was simple: It is a privilege to be loved by God, and to love him—at any cost.
