I thought you should know – June 20, 2021

I'm back from vacation and grateful to be back. Thank you to everyone who helped us with our parish feast day celebration last weekend. I'm especially grateful to Alma Bright and her companions in the Alliance of the Two Hearts, who were the spiritual force responsible for our celebration and who did so much to make it a special day of prayer. Then too I'm grateful to Colleen Hoyt and our joyful hospitality team who prepared the fun part of the day and helped us welcome everyone with a smile. It was great to have Greg and Annette play beautiful music for us. And I'm always grateful to Debbie, Kevin, and Deacon Jim—not much would get done here without you!

Below is the final message from last week in our "Dedicated" homily series. We're starting a new homily series this week about human life and the good, passing days of summer called "Live It Well". For your parish staff, summer is a time for planning and projects. So, if you have any ideas on what would really help our parish make disciples and grow disciples in the year ahead, please let me know! May God bless you!

What is the Immaculate Heart of Mary—the Immaculate Heart of Mary—the Immaculate Heart of Mary? It's the name of this parish; it is the feast we celebrate today; it's pictured in the mosaic here. But behind the parish name and mosaic and party, what is the Immaculate Heart of Mary?

Well, the heart is the part of your body that you can feel beating in our chest if you get still. Mary is the mother of Jesus. We say she is immaculate because throughout Mary's whole life, she was completely dedicated to God. So, we call the heart of Mary, the mother of Jesus, the Immaculate Heart of Mary because Mary never sinned, never marked, or marred the beauty of her soul by sin. We use the heart emoji, we mean affection or liking something or happiness or romance or emotion, but in the Bible, the Jewish people used our physical human hearts, pumping lifeblood through our bodies, to use as a symbol of spiritual center from which life and desire and thought pumps out into our choices and commitments. Therefore, when the Gospel writer Luke wants to describe how Mary kept thinking about Jesus and paying attention to what Jesus had said and reflecting on what Jesus did, Luke writes, "Mary kept all things in her heart".

Each of us have a physical heart, and each of us has that spiritual center, as Mary did also. But Mary's heart had a special significance for us, which is why we make mosaics imagining it and name parishes after it and have parties to celebrate it. When Mary said yes to the Angel Gabriel and conceived Jesus in her womb, her physical human heart supplied Jesus with oxygen and food and blood and life, the way mothers do, for his nine months in her womb. For nine months, Jesus was in the world the way we were in the world when we were small, hidden from the world, but loved by his mother. At the same time, Mary's Immaculate Heart—I'm using the word "heart" in its Jewish meaning now—beat in unison with the Sacred Heart of Jesus. His thoughts were her thoughts. His desires were her desires. His purposes were her purposes, even when she had to ask him, "why have you done this to us?", because she did not understand.

So, there was an alliance between the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary, and Mary in her heart shared the love and work and gift and sacrifice of her son, even on the day when she had to wrap his body and pierced heart for burial. United by love, they had a common purpose: lifting up God's fallen creation, the kingdom come, and the gift of life everlasting. By Mary's alliance and common purpose with Jesus, when Jesus became our brother, Mary said yes to being our mother.

We can, by our free choice, enter into the alliance of Jesus and Mary, of their two Hearts. You can enter today; you can give your life to Jesus as Mary did and with Mary helping you. No one here has to do it—

it's something in good and beautiful in part because you're free—but if you want to do it, it's simple. Just join in with us, when we are all kneeling at the end of Mass, in praying the prayer on the prayer card we gave you as you came in. (If you did not get a prayer card, it's also in the bulletin, or you can simply go back and get a prayer card from a volunteer in the back at the offertory song or at communion.

If you do make a consecration today, the next step is to live it out. Last week, we talked about four ways we can take care of our consecration by prayer: C-Confession, A-Adoration, R-Rosary, E-Eucharist, C-A-R-E CARE. Today, let us learn about another way to care for our consecration, by penance.

Penance is something extra and hard that you offer God in love. Let me give you some examples. One way to do penance is by what you do. For example, you can pray more prayers, that is easy for you to do. Or you can give money to help someone or a good cause even though you are noticing how many expenses you have. A second way to do penance is by what you give up. For example, you can take a cold shower instead of a hot one, or skip a dessert. Now what's the point of not getting something good that you could have had? The point is offering it with love to God. Say, "I give up this hot shower, Lord, to show you I want more self-discipline in your service." Say, "I give up this dessert, Lord, to remember that my real delights are spiritual things, not sugary ones." A third way to do penance is by what you endure. These are the best and often the hardest penances, the time when with faith in God and love for others, you accepted something in your life that you wish wasn't there. For example, suppose you had a bad headache. Go ahead and take aspirin or to lay down in a dark place, you bet. But at the same time, while you wait for relief, make your suffering a penance by offering it with love to God. All you do is talk with Jesus in your own words, simply expressing your hope and faith and love. "Jesus, I wish I didn't have this headache. Even right now, while my head hurts I trust you and I love you, and I have a hope in my heart. I know how much you love me, and so I have hope that somehow, because you love me, you'll see me loving you right now in this hard moment, and you'll make from it and give because of it something good and beautiful to someone in trouble or in need, someone you and I both love."

Penance isn't punishment. It's self-offering and self-discipline, and that's why it is a powerful part of our Christian life. When Mary in 1917 in Fatima, Portugal, appeared to young shepherd children in a vision, she taught them, "Sacrifice yourself for sinners, and say many times to Jesus, especially whenever you make some sacrifice, 'O Jesus, it is for love of you, for the conversion of sinners, and in reparation for sins committed against the Immaculate Heart of Mary".

Whether your family is big or small or just one person in your home, family life gives us lots of opportunities to help others by doing penance. That's why it's a great way to live out our dedication to Jesus and the consecration of our family to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary. It lets us, "like a bride bedecked with her jewels", rejoice even in hard things, because we know that "all things work to the good of those who love God, who are called according to his purpose". You, my dear brothers, and sisters, are called according to God's purpose, called to show his love and to release his power through the humble life of your home. So, I invite you: consecrate your family to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary, and by prayer and penance, shine.

Saint of the Week



Saint John Fisher
Saint of the Day for June 23

Saint John Fisher's Story

John Fisher is usually associated with Erasmus, Thomas More, and other Renaissance humanists. His life therefore, did not have the external simplicity found in the lives of some saints. Rather, he was a man of learning, associated with the intellectuals and political leaders of his day. He was interested in the contemporary culture and eventually became chancellor at Cambridge. He had been made a bishop at 35, and one of his interests was raising the standard of preaching in England. Fisher himself was an accomplished preacher and writer. His sermons on the penitential psalms were reprinted seven times before his death. With the coming of Lutheranism, he was drawn into controversy. His eight books against heresy gave him a leading position among European theologians.

In 1521, Fisher was asked to study the question of King Henry VIII's marriage to Catherine of Aragon, his brother's widow. He incurred Henry's anger by defending the validity of the king's marriage with Catherine, and later by rejecting Henry's claim to be the supreme head of the Church of England.

In an attempt to be rid of him, Henry first had Fisher accused of not reporting all the "revelations" of the nun of Kent, Elizabeth Barton. In feeble health, Fisher was summoned to take the oath to the new Act of Succession. He and Thomas More refused to do so because the Act presumed the legality of Henry's divorce and his claim to be head of the English Church. They were sent to the Tower of London, where Fisher remained 14 months without trial. Fi-

nally both men were sentenced to life imprisonment and loss of goods.

When the two were called to further interrogations, they remained silent. On the supposition that he was speaking privately as a priest, Fisher was tricked into declaring again that the king was not supreme head of the church in England. The king, further angered that the pope had made John Fisher a cardinal, had him brought to trial on the charge of high treason. He was condemned and executed, his body left to lie all day on the scaffold and his head hung on London Bridge. More was executed two weeks later. John Fisher's liturgical feast is celebrated on June 22.

Reflection

Today many questions are raised about Christians' and priests' active involvement in social issues. John Fisher remained faithful to his calling as a priest and bishop. He strongly upheld the teachings of the Church; the very cause of his martyrdom was his loyalty to Rome. He was involved in the cultural enrichment circles as well as in the political struggles of his time. This involvement caused him to question the moral conduct of the leadership of his country.

"The Church has the right, indeed the duty, to proclaim justice on the social, national and international level, and to denounce instances of injustice, when the fundamental rights of man and his very salvation demand it" (*Justice in the World*, 1971 Synod of Bishops).
