I thought you should know - November 1, 2020

Remember to be good citizens and vote on Tuesday. Pray before you vote, asking the Holy Spirit to help you with his gifts of wisdom and counsel. When you vote, remember to consider not only the good of you or people like you, but the good of all, especially those most vulnerable and voiceless.

I wanted to let you know about a change we have made here at Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish and another change we are looking at making in the future. We are now having our daily 8 am Mass in the main church, not in the chapel. Thanks be to God, we are starting to have enough interest in daily Mass that on some days we can't all fit in the Chapel with social distancing. Having Mass in the main church will let us welcome everyone who might want to come. I'd expect that someday when we've overcome COVID and social distancing is not needed that we will return to having daily Mass in our chapel

I really want to make a Mass livestreamed from Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish available on the internet for people in our parish who are homebound, or who need to be especially careful about COVID, or who are just getting started in faith and so might be nervous about coming back to church. To livestream a Mass, we'll need to have internet access in our church, and it seems like the best way to get internet access in our church is to extend our wireless network. Many thanks to Jason Brendel who has been helping us find a technical solution that will fit our needs. My hope would be to have wireless internet installed in the church during November so we are ready to start livestreaming Mass in Advent.

Lastly, here's our last installment of the "Overflowing" homily series. I'm grateful for everyone praying for me and for our parish; your prayers help a lot with homily preparation. Since we've gotten some good feedback about the plan we used for "Overflowing" where different weeks' messages connected to each other in a series, I'm going to have another homily series between now and Advent, and then another one in Advent as we prepare for Christmas.

On September 6, 2020, the Officer Tamarris Bohannon's family accompanied his remains into the Louis Cathedral. As they entered for his funeral, local law enforcement officers stood at attention in silence. Glen Rodgers, a police chaplain with 20 years of personal law enforcement experience, said of that solemn moment, "As they stand at attention, they are thinking about a lot of the situations where it could have been them." Officer Bohannon knew about other city police officers who had been shot and he must have had his own solemn moments where he thought about times when it could have been him. But after those solemn moments, he went back to work, because his family needed him, because he saw the value of his service, and because he saw the good that he gave to his community. He understood it might cost him; on August 29, 2020, responding to a call for help, he paid for that costly good. He was a hero. What would you need to be a hero, to give someone else a costly good?

You can live in a way that most people don't, and most people can't, but you can, by faith in Jesus Christ from God's love overflowing. The stakes are high, because the cost could be high, because the payout could be high, because passing on the bet has its own cost. Day by day we make choices that make us heroes or that make us "self-centered nobody[ies] fixated on the internet" (Thomas E. Woods, "Follow the Faith", Columbia July 2006 p. 21).

Today we heard Jesus say strong words, simple words, beautiful words, words that stick in our mind and words that ring in our ears, words that make sense: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. ... You shall love your neighbor as yourself". That gospel message tells each of us that God intends for us to love our neighbor as our self. God intends for you to be a person like that, to be a saint and a hero, because the measure of a saint or a hero is love. So let's be clear on what love means. Real love means that we (1) we understand what would be good for another person (2) we choose to give the other person that good (3) we do this despite the personal cost. God can help you become a hero, little by little, if you choose to accept the gift of faith, if you chose to move from ambivalence to acceptance, from inertia to action, from lukewarm spirituality to the practice of the faith. At the end of this homily, you'll have to decide what you are going to do.

Faith can give you the wisdom to really understand what is good. With faith, Jesus teaches you God's law and God's plan. With faith, Jesus gives you the Holy Spirit who helps you pay attention to others and notice what might help them.

Faith can give you the motivation to give. Faith points out how good God has been to you, and so you got a motive to give: gratitude. Faith says how much Jesus loves you and how much Jesus loves each human being, and so you got a motive to give: he love you and you love him and he loves them. Faith reveals that you are made in the likeness of God. You are not a mistake and you are not just an animal. You are made in the image and likeness of God, who is the great giver of gifts, and so you got a motive to give: it is your identity and fulfillment.

Faith can help you pay the cost. Believe in Jesus, and you know that a loving Father sees your deeds and treasures what you give and values the cost you pay. Believe in Jesus, and you know that the Holy Spirit is by your side, providing, overcoming, promising and urging you on, making a way where there was no way. Believe in Jesus, and you know your costly gift unites you to his, so that the great work of Jesus on cross pours grace into the world anew through your love of God and your love of neighbor.

Brothers and sisters, Rev. Martin Luther King said, "Freedom isn't free". Sir Isaac Newton said, "If I have seen farther than others, it is because I have stood on the shoulders of giants." I don't know if you will be famous, but I know you're supposed to be a giant, because God intends for you to lift others up. We've see again and again over the past weeks that faith in Jesus means you can live in a way that most people don't and most people can't, but you can, from God's love overflowing. So I invite you to put your faith in Jesus Christ, and to live your faith in Jesus Christ. This week, give someone a costly good.



Saint of the Week



Saint Martin de Porres
Saint of the Day for November 3

Saint Martin de Porres' Story

"Father unknown" is the cold legal phrase sometimes used on baptismal records. "Half-breed" or "war souvenir" is the cruel name inflicted by those of "pure" blood. Like many others, Martin might have grown to be a bitter man, but he did not. It was said that even as a child he gave his heart and his goods to the poor and despised.

He was the son of a freed woman of Panama, probably black but also possibly of indigenous stock, and a Spanish grandee of Lima, Peru. His parents never married each other. Martin inherited the features and dark complexion of his mother. That irked his father, who finally acknowledged his son after eight years. After the birth of a sister, the father abandoned the family. Martin was reared in poverty, locked into a low level of Lima's society.

When he was 12, his mother apprenticed him to a barber-surgeon. Martin learned how to cut hair and also how to draw blood—a standard medical treatment then—care for wounds, and prepare and administer medicines.

After a few years in this medical apostolate, Martin applied to the Dominicans to be a "lay helper," not feeling himself worthy to be a religious brother. After nine years, the example of his prayer and penance, charity and humility, led the community to request him to make full religious profession. Many of his nights were spent in prayer and penitential practices; his days were filled with nursing the sick and caring for the poor. It was particularly impressive that he treated all people regardless of their color, race, or status. He was instrumental in founding an orphanage, took care of slaves brought from Africa, and managed the daily alms of the priory with

practicality, as well as generosity. He became the procurator for both priory and city, whether it was a matter of "blankets, shirts, candles, candy, miracles or prayers!" When his priory was in debt, he said, "I am only a poor mulatto. Sell me. I am the property of the order. Sell me."

Side by side with his daily work in the kitchen, laundry, and infirmary, Martin's life reflected God's extraordinary gifts: ecstasies that lifted him into the air, light filling the room where he prayed, bi-location, miraculous knowledge, instantaneous cures, and a remarkable rapport with animals. His charity extended to beasts of the field and even to the vermin of the kitchen. He would excuse the raids of mice and rats on the grounds that they were underfed; he kept stray cats and dogs at his sister's house.

Martin became a formidable fundraiser, obtaining thousands of dollars for dowries for poor girls so that they could marry or enter a convent.

Many of his fellow religious took Martin as their spiritual director, but he continued to call himself a "poor slave." He was a good friend of another Dominican saint of Peru, Rose of Lima.

Reflection

Racism is a sin almost nobody confesses. Like pollution, it is a "sin of the world" that is everybody's responsibility but apparently nobody's fault. One could hardly imagine a more fitting patron of Christian forgiveness—on the part of those discriminated against—and Christian justice—on the part of reformed racists—than Martin de Porres.
